TWU ANNOUNCES FALL 2014 ENROLLMENT

Fall 2014 enrollment at Texas Woman's University includes the university's bestqualified and largest first-year student class, more returning first-year students and an increase in transfer students.

TWU's overall fall 2014 student enrollment is 15,075 students, which is flat compared to fall 2013.

TWU's new first-year class of 1,183 students is the largest in university history, up 1.6 percent from fall 2013. In addition, this year's first-year class has the strongest academic credentials in TWU's history, including:

- An average G.P.A. of 3.33
- 14 percent in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class;
- 39 percent in the top 25 percent of their high school graduating class; and
- 101 Honors Scholars.

In addition, TWU's first-year student retention rate of 72.4 percent is up for the fourth consecutive year.

Also, enrollment of new transfer students is up 3 percent to 1,381 students.

"The quality and size of our first-year class shows that more high-achieving students are choosing TWU, and our increased first-year student retention rate shows these students remain successful while here," said Gary Ray, vice president of enrollment services at TWU. "Also, the increase in transfer students, despite improvements in the economy which impacts community college enrollment, indicates that transfer students are picking TWU because of our academic programs' reputation, cost and overall value."

Graduate student enrollment is down 3.6 percent to 5,396 students. Mr. Ray attributes this decline to some TWU graduate programs only admitting new students every other year.

Semester credit hours are up slightly to 151,067 hours for fall 2014, compared to 151,033 for fall 2013. Student credit hours, not headcount, are the basis of the university's state funding.

Prior to joining TWU, she served as the dean of dental hygiene for Utah College and as the chair of the University of Oklahoma's Department of Dental Hygiene. Ms. Nunn received her associate's degree in dental hygiene from Coastal Bend College, her bachelor's degree from Texas State University and her master's degree from Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi.

The Chairs and Academic Administrators Management Program or was created in 2009 by the Academy for Academic Leadership (AAL) an international consulting and professional development organization based in Atlanta, to address the unique challenges and opportunities encountered by department chairs and academic administrators within colleges and schools of the health professions. Since its inception, nearly 300 department chairs and academic administrators from programs in medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, nursing, allied health and other health professions have participated in CAAMP.
