DANCE TO THE MUSIC AT AMPHITHEATER DEDICATION

Celebrate! Celebrate! Dance to the music -- That's exactly what faculty, staff, students, alumni and friends at TWU are invited to do on Sat., Oct. 7, when TWU formally dedicates the Bernice Abreo Fischer Amphitheater. The facility, funded by alumna Bernice Fischer, is centrally located on the TWU Denton campus.

The event kicks off with a 5:30 p.m. dance performance, featuring works by TWU students and faculty from the department of performing arts programs in dance. A reception will be held in the rotunda of the TWU Blagg-Huey Library immediately following the performance. The dedication and the reception are open to the campus community and the general public.

The new green space -- which replaced the TWU Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building -- features a sloping, grassy lawn (just right for blankets and lawn chairs), lighting and a stage that bears the name of Bernice Abreo Fischer. The TWU amphitheater provides a unique setting in Denton for dance, drama and musical productions under the stars, as well as other activities and programs. The stage area includes a special dance floor, plus insets for scenery and lighting, and a new portable sound system. "Bernice Fischer leaves a legacy for Texas Woman's University, its students, faculty and staff -- as well as our community -- that will touch their lives for many years to come," said Jane Erwin (institutional development). "She is humble and very caring, and she loves the cultural arts, too."

TWU's dance company DanceWorks will perform three pieces: "Carmen's Tantalizing Tea Party," choreographed by Elizabeth Gormley de Moraes; "Fists of Spaghetti," choreographed by Stephanie Beauchamp; and "Bushwackers," choreographed by Kim Tap and based on rap and body rhythms. The dancers also will present two excerpts from *Colours: A Musical Allegory*, TWU's first drama production of the fall 2000 season, which opens Oct. 13. (The musical revue is an original script written by TWU students; it was the result of the work of an interdisciplinary class.) TWU's International Folk Dance Company will perform a new folklorico work. Approximately 45 TWU students will be involved in the dance performance.

The amphitheater's namesake, Bernice Fischer, graduated from Texas State College for Women (now TWU) in 1941 with her bachelor's degree in Spanish. She moved to Florida after graduation and then to Alabama, where she spent 32 years as an education specialist for Air University at Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Ala. Fischer retired in 1973 and then traveled with friends to South America, where she met her future husband, Virgil Fischer. They traveled extensively until his death in 1992. Fischer will attend the dedication.

Fischer describes herself as "a Texan by birth, an Alabamian by career and a Nevadan by marriage." A resident of Las Vegas, Fischer donated \$150,000 to TWU for the amphitheater; \$35,000 for the Bernice Fischer Endowment for Faculty Excellence; and \$15,000 to support renovation of one single-parent apartment in TWU's Reagan-Houston Hall.

The following health screenings will be available (costs are noted): flu immunization, \$12; pneumonia immunization, \$20; master chemistry blood work, \$18; lipid profile, \$10; hypothyroid profile, \$10; prostatic specific antigen (PSA), \$20; ovarian cancer screening, \$40; complete blood count (CBC), \$10; female profile (master chemistry blood work, CBC and hypothyroid), \$40; male profile (master chemistry blood work, CBC and PSA), \$40; tetanus immunization, \$10; osteoporosis screening, \$40; stroke screening, \$40; and blood typing, \$15.

Free screenings for hearing, vision, HIV and depression will be offered.

Free information will be provided about women's health, alcohol awareness, lifestyle programs, blood pressure, senior fitness, personal trainers, epilepsy services, shelter services, nutrition, personal safety, campus recreation, fire safety, organ donation education and chair massage. DRAMA SEASON STARTS WITH COLOURS

Described as a "work in progress," *Colours* kicks off the 2000-2001 theatrical season at TWU in October. The show will be staged Oct. 13 to 17 at 8 p.m. in Redbud Theatre; a 2 p.m. matinee is scheduled on Oct. 15. Ticket prices are: \$12 for adults; \$9 for TWU faculty and staff, senior citizens and non-TWU students; and \$5 for TWU students and children under age 12.

"Colours is a fast-paced musical revue that looks at life through a kaleidoscope of hues," said Sharon Benge (performing arts, drama). "Colours was created through a year-long process during which

dialogues, songs and dances were developed and polished. The play continued to progress in workshops, much in the same fashion as the Broadway musical *A Chorus Line*. An invited audience last spring helped the creators learn more about material that they revised over the summer for the upcoming production."

This original revue, which students helped to create, also is TWU's entry for the Kennedy Center/American College Theatre Festival competition. The show travels to the first KC/ACTF event on Oct. 28 at Collin County Community College. Winners proceed to a regional competition and on to the final stage at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. *Colours* also will be entered in competition for "Best Original Script" in the region.

Directed by Nikki Silva, the company includes Cicely Binford, Catherine Cockrell, Jenny English, Cris Galvan and Andy Gosnell. Members of the ensemble group are Jamica Hooks, Jenae Yerger, Joe Zamora, Dennis Sloan and Zack Schrotter. TWU performing arts faculty members Stuart Younse and J Hamons are directing music and choreography, respectively.

The cabaret-style scenery is designed by Marketa Fantova, and the colorful costumes have been created by Madeline Kleid. Michele Bordeaux is serving as lighting designer, and Jerry Dawson is coordinating sound design. Kirk Corley is serving as technical director, and Stephanie Rauch is dramaturg. A three-piece combo will accompany the musical numbers.

STAFF COUNCIL MARKS ITS FIRST YEAR

The TWU Staff Council is celebrating the initial year of its existence at TWU as the first elected, representative body for staff on all campuses. The council comprises representatives of the more than 16 staff job families in Denton, Dallas and Houston. Each job family elects one representative for every 29 people in the family. Representatives serve for two years, and they also serve on one of the council's six committees: election; human resources issues; executive; communications; professional development; and service.

Co-chair Susan Phillips said, "Beginning with our first meeting, Staff Council representatives wanted to make an immediate difference for all staff. We have made progress during the past year, although not quite at the pace we had envisioned. We've learned valuable lessons along the way -- the most important of which is that newly-formed representative organizations have to take the long view and work first to establish a strong foundation that they then can build on. This truly is a lesson in personal and professional growth."

The council views communication as its top issue. Dr. Wilkes Berry (academic affairs), who serves as the Staff Council's liaison to the university's administration, is helping the organization find ways to bring staff concerns and suggestions to the attention of administrators, and to get their response. Dr. Ann Stuart (chancellor's office) has been generous with her time and has met with the council on three occasions. "We appreciate her willingness to talk with us and her straight-forward responses to our requests," said Phillips. "Karen Faught (human resources) also met several times with Staff Council representatives. She also emphasized that she will respond to Staff Council inquiries, even if she can't guarantee palatable answers. And we will continue to work to forge strong lines of communication with other individuals and university groups."

Staff Council isn't the arbiter on individual problems -- those are handled by the department of human resources. Instead, the council takes the concerns that staff members send to the organization; identifies those that affect a particular or general group of staff; and then takes those concerns to the people who have the authority to act. "The Staff Council will use every opportunity to point out the role staff play in the success of TWU and to remind the university community that diversity includes choice of job," added Phillips. "We will continue to emphasize that our dedicated and experienced staff are worthy of being asked to 'stand and be recognized.""

During TWU's Centennial year, the Staff Council is planning to present a staff enrichment program, a spring reception and a fall welcome. Members will continue to work on current projects -- such as establishing an employee recognition program; exploring ways to improve access for physical plant

employees to computers; and learning how holidays are determined, for example. New concerns and suggestions will be add to the project list as they are received.

Phillips tells staff members that they should participate in Staff Council by sharing information and questions, by voting and by participating in the work of the council itself. "Talk to your representative or send your ideas in to any Staff Council representative. Run for a seat on staff council during the next election. We have six vacancies that will be filled soon, and elections for two-year seats on the council will be held next summer. Volunteer to serve as an at-large member on one of the committees. Together we can make a difference in our workplace and at TWU."
