REGENTS INCREASE TUITION, FEES AND APPROVE CURRICULUM AND PROGRAM CHANGES

The Texas Woman's University Board of Regents voted to increase tuition and approved changes to the core curriculum and other programs at its quarterly meeting in Dallas Feb. 24.

The board voted to increase board authorized tuition from \$73 to \$78 per semester credit hour starting in fall 2006. Regents also gave their approval to charge tuition to reflect a new state policy from the Texas Legislature. Undergraduate residents will now be charged non-resident tuition for credit hours that exceed by at least 30 hours the number of semester credit hours required for completion of the degree program in which the student is enrolled.

Regents also agreed to increase the student services fee from \$19.64 to \$21.01 per semester credit hour for up to nine hours starting in fall 2006. The board also approved offering commuter student meal plans ranging in cost from \$300 to \$500 starting in summer 2006.

Pending Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board approval, TWU regents approved modifying TWU's core curriculum requirements by adding three semester credit hours in mathematics — a quantitative literacy course. They also voted to combine the women's studies and multicultural requirements, so only one, three-hour multicultural women's studies course will be required.

Regents voted to allow the Department of Nutrition and Food Sciences to offer a master of science in institutional administration degree as an online program starting in fall 2006, pending Coordination Board approval. The board also approved changes to the healthcare administration program in Dallas. Pending Coordinating Board approval, the master of healthcare administration degree in Dallas will be renamed the master of health systems management degree and will be moved from the College of Health Sciences to the School of Management in the College of Arts and Sciences. The master of healthcare administration program in Houston is not affected by this change.
