MOVEMENT TELLS A TALE

The temperance movement. The civil rights movement. The women's movement. Mark Taylor wants to start a movement of his own -- the "movement movement."

"I believe in the notion that dancing is not just for dancers," said Taylor, artistic director/principal choreographer of the Pittsburgh-based modern dance company and school known as Dance Alloy. "I want the world to see the beauty in all kinds of movement -- the little, complicated dances that all of us do every day -- and I enjoy bringing people's awareness to their bodies and to movement, even if it's not considered dance."

In an effort to get his little revolution under way, Taylor will bring his company to TWU for a performance at 8 p.m. on Sat., Feb. 26, in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Tickets are \$10 for adults; \$7 for TWU faculty, staff and seniors; and \$5 for TWU students.

The six-member company, which tours widely and commissions works from many celebrated choreographers, will perform repertoire by Taylor and Los Angeles-based choreographer David Rousseve. Featured works include: *Bodice Ripper*, a duet inspired by romance novels; *Xanadu*, a high-energy work for four dancers; and *Prestige of Evil*, a modern pseudo-ballet that serves as a commentary on the allure of violence in entertainment. Also on the program is *Applause*, a Taylor-written solo that will be performed by Mary Williford-Shade (performing arts, dance). A long-time collaborator with Taylor, Williford-Shade said she always looks forward to the opportunity to work with him.

"I really like his respect for the performer and the input he allows you to have in the creative process," said Williford-Shade, who has worked with Taylor on and off for the last two decades. "He's quite good at choreographic construction and is very detailed in how he puts his work together, especially when it comes to creating improvisational scores that give dancers the chance to help him create movement."

While in Denton, Taylor and Dance Alloy also will conduct workshops at Denton and Ryan high schools for their respective drama and music departments. Taylor said the company has long had a strong

commitment to spreading the word about modern dance, both on stage and off. "I feel like there's a strong association that comes from performance and another association that comes from communicating what we do -- helping people to understand and enjoy it," he said. "Our mission is such that both of those have equal importance, so our company does a lot of teaching and communicating about what we do on stage.

"I know that modern dance is not at the top of everyone's hit list in terms of the kind of entertainment they choose -- maybe because it requires some participation on behalf of the audience. However, the more of that kind of work we do, the more communication there is with the audience, because what we're doing by educating others is building potential audiences," said Taylor. CALLING ALL FACULTY: EXPERTS NEEDED!

Do you ever wonder where newspapers, television, magazines and radio outlets find the university experts that they use? Although the TWU office of public information sends stories out targeted news media, those efforts reach a select list of journalists. Within the last two months, however, news staff in public information have been making daily contact with media outlets nationally and internationally through an online subscription to ProfNet.

"ProfNet is a national and global online service that links reporters who are working on stories to experts who can help them with information, research or opinions that address the reporter's needs," said Ann Hatch (public information). "Our office receives three to four bulletins daily from ProfNet that give us an opportunity to respond with our faculty's names and contact numbers (or e-mail addresses) -- including online news outlets. That contact represents a potential mention or feature focusing on a faculty member and getting the university's name in the news."

Faculty members who are identified as potential sources for stories at TWU also receive an e-mail from OPI staff that provides them with a copy of the reporter's query and the university's response, sending the expert's name to the media outlet. "We don't receive a call back or a contact from every reporter or organization we respond to, but we are getting responses and placements," added Hatch. "The key to our success is our faculty's willingness to participate and to respond within the time frame that the reporter needs."

This spring, the office of public information will replace a published expert's listing with a new online format that will help staff members identify faculty for ProfNet needs, as well as for reporters who need sources and call the university directly. An index and general information about the university will be included on the site. All faculty who would like to be listed and who are willing to serve as an expert in their field of teaching or research are asked to notify the office of public information by e-mail and provide the following information by Fri., Feb. 25:

- name and courtesy title;
- department, college or school;
- office number; home phone number (Please indicate whether you are providing permission to post your home number online or whether you will give permission to the news staff to call you at home if needed.);
- e-mail address:
- area(s) of expertise and/or topics you would be willing to discuss; and
- any background (degrees, etc.), research or topics you would like to list that illustrate your areas of expertise.
