## Regents meet at Houston Center

In a regularly scheduled meeting at the TWU Houston Center on July 28, TWU Regents considered a lengthy agenda which included approval of the \$24.75 million operating budget for 1977-78.

In addition to routine business, the Board also took the following actions:

\*Approved a Classified Pay Plan for 1977-78

\*Approved recommended faculty promotions and tenure

\*Approved a change from 3.0 grade point system to 4.0 grade point system recommended by the Faculty Council

\*Approved a plan for the reorganization of the Colleges of Arts and Sciences and of Fine Arts

\*Approved the establishment of the Office of Information

The classified pay plan outlines employment procedures for all classified personnel, sets forth the basic rate schedule of compensation, establishes codes, titles, and salary ranges for classified positions, and specifies job descriptions. *(continued on page 4)*

## Creative arts self expression for handicapped

A wide variety of speakers and participants have completed a two-week course in "Self Expression for Handicapped Clients through the Creative Arts" held August 1-12 at the TWU Denton Campus.

Students attended class four hours a day and participated in lectures and demonstrations of how dance, art, music, and drama can be adapted for handicapped people of all ages. Numerous speakers presented a different program each day.

Among the organizations which provided speakers were the United Cerebral Palsy Association of Dallas, the Texas Commission for the Blind, the National Association for Retarded Citizens, and the Texas Commission on Arts and Humanities.

Ms. Wendy Perks, executive director of the National Committee of Arts for the Handicapped from Washington,

D.C. demonstrated some of her methods for teaching creative problem solving, composition, rhythm, and language development in an attempt to bring together music, dance, and drama in training programs for people who work with the handicapped.

"This inter-disciplinary activity grew out of the success of our workshop last summer on creative arts for the severely handicapped," said Dr. Claudine Sherrill, professor in the College of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation and coordinator of the workshop.

This two-week institute is a preliminary for an in-service education program for next year, said Dr. Sherrill. TWU will be the only university in the nation with a program of creative arts for the handicapped funded directly by the Bureau of Education for the Handicapped, she said.

The proposed reorganization of the Colleges of Arts and Sciences and of Fine Arts involves the establishment of two new colleges: The College of Humanities and Fine Arts and the College of Natural and Social Sciences in the University General Divisions. Each college will be headed by a Dean.

Subject to Coordinating Board

approval, the College of Humanities and Fine Arts will consist of the departments of art, English, foreign languages, journalism and broadcasting, and music and theater; and the College of Natural and Social Sciences will consist of the departments of biology, business and economics, chemistry, communication science,

history and government, mathematics and physics, and sociology and social work.

The new Office of Information will combine publications, field services, and news services. Searches are currently underway for a news coordinator and a director of information.



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
