

accident cases and in the specialized fields of cerebral palsy, poliomyelitis, heart diseases and work with the aged.

Rehabilitation centers being developed in many communities are employing Occupational Therapists in their programs. This work is expected to expand greatly in the near future.

Graduates of the TWU School of Occupational Therapy are employed throughout the United States, Hawaii and Alaska.

Scholarships

The TWU General Catalogue lists a wide variety of student scholarships. In addition, for students who make superior records in their university work in Occupational Therapy, a considerable number of very substantial grants are available to help cover costs of the senior year and the months of clinical practice.

Costs Are Low

The total is only \$648.00 for the nine months' session (two complete semesters). This includes your room in the Regular Dormitory System and meals in the Central Dining Hall, tuition, and medical, activity, and linen fees. The University furnishes your textbooks (which would cost approximately \$60.00) without added charge. A season ticket to all Concert and Drama Series programs is included. The linen fee includes laundering of bed linens (which are furnished by the University) of students in the Regular Dormitory System.

Only additional costs are very small fees for laboratory courses (\$2.00 for a three-semester-hour course) and private instruction in music.

Girls who need very much to economize may apply for residence in the Rusk Cooperative System, where room and board is available at a substantially lower rate.

Note: By Texas law, out-of-state girls pay an additional \$125.00 tuition each semester of the 1958-59 long session. This sum is payable at registration. The total for full-time out-of-state and foreign students is \$898.00 for the nine months' session.

The Medical Lectures are given at Southwestern Medical School in Dallas. Ten months of affiliations are required to be completed for eligibility to take the National Registration Examination which is given twice each year by the American Occupational Therapy Association.

Upon completion of the Junior year and the Pediatric medical lecture, students may do a two months affiliation during the summer in Pediatric Centers. After graduation the last eight months affiliations will be done in Physical Disabilities, Tuberculosis, Psychiatry, and General Medicine and Surgery. A clinical affiliation fee of \$50.00 is required.

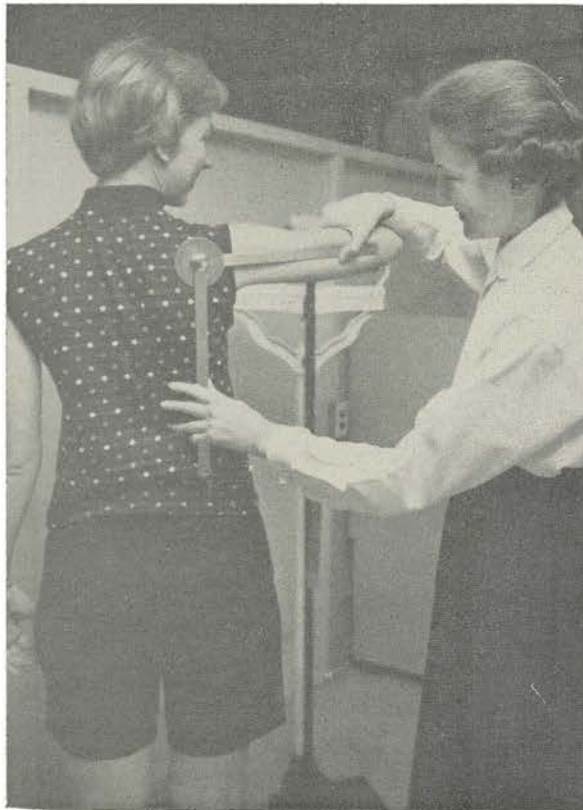
The Challenge

Among the healing arts, none provides a greater challenge to the woman who enters this new profession. None offers a greater reward to the creative personality. No work is more inspired or inspiring, nor any more dedicated.

Combined in the personality of the successful Occupational Therapist must be much of the knowledge and the insight of the medical practitioner, the sympathetic competence of the nurse, the warmth and companionship of the friend and — above all — the creative gifts of the teacher.

The Skills

More than in any other of the allied medical professions, the Occupational Therapist must be prepared not only to instruct but to demonstrate. She must possess a reasonable competence in the skills with which she wishes to inculcate the patient-student, for the aim of the treatment is intensely prac-



tical — to increase his usefulness to himself, his family and his community.

What Is Occupational Therapy?

Perhaps the simplest definition in everyday words, would be "curing by doing." More technically, occupational therapy is the science of employing creative and manual, educational and recreational activities in a restorative program for the sick, injured and disabled. The therapy should be inherent in the activity and must treat not only the disabled area, but the person as a whole.

Though the practice of occupational therapy is as old as civilization, as basic as common sense, it has been mainly used since World Wars I and II. With their residue of thousands of handicapped veterans, the profession has received the tremendous impetus that we see today in Crippled Children and Adult treatment centers, public school special education programs, state Mental and Tuberculosis hospitals, along with private, city, and county hospitals.

Pre-Training

To those looking to this profession as a career, it is important to become familiar with the work of the therapist and the requirements of training. It is wise to make hospital visits and see occupational therapy in practice. An interview with the Director of the TWU School of Occupational Therapy also is recommended when applying for training.

University Courses

For the *high school graduate*, the School of Occupational Therapy at TWU provides an opportunity to combine general and professional education leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts with a major in Occupational Therapy.

The *student who transfers* to Texas Woman's University Occupational Therapy course after one or two years of college work may receive credit toward fulfillment of B.S. or B.A. degree; however, due to curriculum standards of the American Medical Association, the American Occupational Therapy Association, and the Texas Woman's University requirements, additional semesters will be required.

The *college graduate* can complete the requirements of the Advanced Standing Certificate Course, which is an 18-months course leading to a certificate in Occupational Therapy.

All graduates, after the required clinical experience, are eligible to take the national registration examination, conducted twice a year by the American Occupational Therapy Association, in order to become professionally qualified to practice. Upon successful completion of the examination, the therapist is entitled to use the initials "OTR" after her name.

Opportunities and Salaries

There are active opportunities in the United States for at least 8,000 more Registered Occupational Therapists. Salaries compare favorably with those in other medically related professions and range from \$3,900 to \$9,500 annually. Regular

working hours, general vacation policies and other hospital benefits can be anticipated.

Students in Clinical Affiliation

The latest check showed that TWU Occupational Therapy students in clinical affiliation were located in such hospitals as:

Y.; Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children, Dallas; Crippled Children's Hospital Home, Memphis, Tenn.; Topeka State Hospital, Topeka, Kans.; Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, Omaha, Nebr.; Veterans Administration Hospital, Waco, Houston, and American Lake, Washington, Crippled Children's Society of Fort Worth, and others.

Many Positions Available to Graduates

Today the Registered Occupational Therapist has her choice of positions throughout the country and in foreign lands. The demand for personnel in military service hospitals is increasing and civilian hospitals are continuing to expand their occupational therapy programs.
