CAMPUS COMMUNITY CALLED TO CONVOCATION

The TWU community -- all faculty, staff and students -- are called upon to share honors and awards during Honors Convocation on Thurs., April 24, at 10:30 a.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Dr. Carol Surlles (president's office) has announced that all classes on the Denton campus will be dismissed from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Thursday for the ceremony. Offices that can be closed during this period may post a notice indicating when they will re-open, and offices that cannot close should arrange for coverage during the convocation.

Nan Hutchins Bailey, chair of the TWU board of regents, will deliver the keynote address. Bailey, appointed to the TWU board of regents in 1993, was elected chair in 1995. A resident of Tyler, Texas, she is a community volunteer with 10 years of experience in teaching mathematics. She holds a bachelor's degree in mathematics and in French from Hollins College, and she earned her master's degree -- also in mathematics -- from George Mason University. Her teaching experience includes courses at the secondary, junior college and college levels.

Bailey also has served as a volunteer in the Tyler Junior College SOS mathematics tutoring program and with PATH (People Attempting to Help). She is a member of the Mathematical Association of America, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Association for Women in Mathematics and the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges. Bailey's mother, Martha Jo Hawes of Tyler, graduated from TWU in 1943. Her grandmother, Willie Lain Hawes, also was an alumna.

The general public is invited to attend the event, and the TWU National Alumnae Association will host a picnic for everyone on the Pioneer Woman circle immediately following the ceremony. The picnic will honor all 1996-97 graduates.

The line of march for the academic procession will form at 10:20 a.m. on the circular drive immediately in front of the Music Building and will move into MJPH promptly at 10:30 a.m. Program participants, honorees and others who will be seated on stage will precede the academic procession into the hall. DON'T FORGET: NEW AREA CODE IS COMING!

"It happened in Dallas and Houston. Now it's coming to Denton. On Sun., May 25, the '817' area code will split into three area codes," said Bill Adams (information technology services). "Metropolitan Fort Worth and its surrounding area will retain the '817' code, while the area south of Fort Worth will become '254' and the northern part -- including Denton -- will be area code '940.'" Adams recommends TWU faculty, staff, students, alums and friends remember several key points to successfully navigate the area code change:

■ Long distance zones are not changing. Any number that can be called toll-free today will continue to be toll-free, even if that number is assigned to an area code that is different from the caller's (area code) -- just like today.

■ For long distance calls between area codes, dial "1" plus the area code, plus the 7-digit number -- just like today.

■ For local calls between area codes, you must dial the area code, plus the 7-digit number. Do not dial "1" -- the "1" is used only for long distance.

■ For local calls within the new "940" area code, dialing the 7-digit number will work, unless that number is being used in another area code. If that is the case, then you must dial the area code, plus the 7-digit number.

During the transition period from May 25 to Aug. 24, calls to all phone numbers in the existing "817" area code will continue to be completed if the "817" area code is dialed.

UPDATE ON TWU ATHLETICS

With the hometown crowd of 1,150 cheering at Brougham Pavilion, host team Seattle Pacific University scored a school team record of 192.250 to defeat the four-time national gymnastics champions from TWU by just .725 points. The Pioneers, who finished with a 191.525, were leading the Falcons by .125 going into the last rotation with TWU on the vault and SPU on floor exercise. The Pioneers hit all six vault attempts and ended with a total of 47.95 points -- better than their regular season average. But the Falcons totaled 48.70 on the floor, enough to make up the difference and more.

"We hit 22 of 24 routines, which is probably the best all year," said Frank Kudlac (kinesiology/intercollegiate athletics). "A friend just explained it to me this way. We were up in a high tree for four years, and the fall is hard when you lose after all that time. We did the best we could. We didn't give this championship away."

Sophomore Kim Koenig, who did not repeat as the all-around champion the previous evening after she fell on the bars, put together four solid performances and finished the evening as the top all-arounder with 38.925 points. Her 9.825 on balance beam was the best score in the finals. Sophomore Kassidy Hamilton, who fell on a tumbling pass in the team preliminaries, nailed her floor routine with a 9.8 and tied SPU's Kathy Siwek for first place in that event. California State University-Sacramento came in third overall with 189.800 points, followed by University of California-Santa Barbara with 189.150. In other news:

■ TWU will host the 1997 Lone Star Conference men's and women's tennis tournament April 24-26. Action for both men's and women's teams will begin on Thursday at 8:30 a.m. on the TWU tennis courts, plus Goldfield Center and Ryan High School. The women's finals will be held on Saturday at 9 a.m., followed by the men's finals at noon, both at TWU.

Thirteen institutions will participate in the tournament: Abilene Christian University, Cameron University, the University of Central Oklahoma, East Central University (Okla.), Eastern New Mexico University (women only), Harding University, Midwestern State University, Northeastern State University, Southeastern Oklahoma State University, Southwestern Oklahoma State University (men only), Tarleton State University (women only), TWU (women only) and West Texas A&M University. Abilene Christian is the defending women's champion; no men's tournament was played last year. Tournament seeds were determined on Sun., April 20.
