## **FEDERATION TAKES REINS OF DALLAS EDUCATION CENTER**

The Federation of North Texas Area Universities -- TWU, Texas A&M University-Commerce and the University of North Texas -- took the reins of responsibility in a management transition from the Alliance for Higher Education (effective Sept. 1, 1997) for the Dallas Education Center. As one of several institutions offering courses at the center, TWU has been involved in the DEC since its inception. Dr. Carol Surles (president's office), as current FNTAU chair, spoke during a press conference in Dallas on Aug. 12 when the announcement was made.

During the meeting, participants discussed new strategic initiatives for the center, beginning fall 1997. The new strategies, which were developed to further increase student enrollments and to more effectively serve downtown Dallas employees and residents seeking a college education, are:

- Assumption of daily operational management by FNTAU;
- Appointment of a new executive director for the DEC;
- An increase in marketing focus;
- Addition of non-credit, professional development courses to the curriculum; and
- Implementation of plans to seek approval for full-degree programs on site.

Participating DEC institutions include the Dallas County Community College District, TAMU-Commerce, TWU, the University of Texas at Dallas and UNT.

"When I attended my first meeting of the Alliance for Higher Education three years ago, I was delighted to discuss the potential of the center. It was immediately obvious to me that the DEC was a jewel-in-the-making," said Surles as she opened the press conference. "Over the past three years, our north Texas community of leaders in higher education, in private corporations and in other sectors have brought the center's concept and philosophy into clear focus....During the course of our many discussions, the members of AHE have shared a mutual goal: to educate and serve the people of this region; to enhance their lives; and to promote the public good."

She added, "The time has come now to move to another level of the center's development, and I am delighted that the Federation of North Texas Area Universities voted to assume the administration of the Dallas Education Center....TWU is pleased to have played a role in our significant achievements to this point and to be a part of this historic administrative change."

Participants also acknowledged the support of the business community for the DEC -- a point that was echoed by Tom Dunning, chair of the DEC council of trustees. "Businesses and foundations have backed the project from the start and firmly believe that the DEC is an asset for downtown, the educational and corporate communities, employees and residents," said Dunning.

Established in June 1994, the DEC was started primarily through the efforts of the Central Dallas Association, the Greater Dallas Chamber of Commerce, AHE and the Dallas Citizens' Council. It is the state's first multi-institutional higher education facility. Dr. Edward Pauley will serve as the center's new executive director.

## **OFFICES SHOULD CHECK POSITIONS THAT MUST BE REAPPOINTED**

Employees who are working as a GRA, GA, GTA, on-call or in a temporary position -- including visiting faculty, adjuncts and all grant-funded positions during the 1997-98 fiscal year -- must be reappointed for any portion of the appointment that extends beyond Aug. 31, 1997, according to the department of human resources. "These employees and positions do not appear in the operating budget and must be processed by personnel transaction form (PTF)," said Carri Cronig (human resources). "Please complete a PTF to reappoint any employee(s) who will continue to work in those categories during the 1997-98 fiscal year."

Human resources will apply the appropriate benefit replacement pay (BRP) amounts for each individual. When the PTF is received in human resources, the appropriate BRP amount and applicable salary increase will be entered on the PTF. A copy of the PTF then will be returned to the department reflecting the additional information. PTFs should be submitted to human resources no later than Mon., Sept. 1, to ensure that these employees are included on the September payroll. For more information, call ext. 3555.

## **REP APPLICATIONS SOUGHT**

During the first three years of their appointment, TWU faculty are eligible to submit a proposal to the Research Enhancement Program for funds that can be used either for research or creative activities. Application materials are available now from the office of research and grants administration in Denton at 8-1-3375 or from the office of research in Houston at 8-4-2482. Tenured or tenure-track full-time faculty are eligible to submit one proposal for the fall 1997 semester competition. Full-time faculty who are not on tenure track but who are instructors or clinical professors in the TWU Institute of Health Sciences *and* whose appointment began on or after Jan. 1, 1995, also are eligible to apply. Awards are limited to \$6,000.

"The primary purpose of the Research Enhancement Program is to provide seed money so that a faculty member will be able to compete more successfully for larger grants from outside sources so that she or he can continue a research project or creative activity," said Dr. Sondra Ferstl (research and grants). Projects may begin in early January and must be completed by Aug. 31, 1998. The deadline for applications is Wed., Oct. 1, 1997.

## **LIS OFFERS FELLOWSHIPS**

The TWU School of Library and Information Studies is offering four master's degree fellowships under the Library Career Training Grant Program. Each fellowship, which is awarded to students who are studying to become children's or youth services librarians, includes full tuition and fees for 12 months and a stipend of up to \$14,000, depending on financial need. Recipients may begin their studies in the fall 1997 or spring 1998 semester.

Applicants must have received unconditional admission to the TWU School of Library and Information Studies and the Graduate School for the fall 1997 or spring 1998 semester. They also must be willing to commit to full-time study for one year.

Interested persons should submit an application for graduate admission, their official GRE scores, official transcripts from all universities they have attended and a \$25 application fee to the office of graduate admissions. They also must submit the School of Library and Information Studies' application for admission to graduate study, three letters of recommendation and the Free Application for Federal Student Aid form to the school.
