TWU WILL CONTINUE IN-HOUSE CUSTODIAL SERVICES

During a meeting with custodial staff on Thurs., June 19, Dr. Brenda Floyd (finance and administration) informed employees that TWU will continue to use in-house custodial staff rather than contracting off-campus for those services. Floyd, who stressed that custodial services and all other services on campus would continue to be reviewed for performance and efficiency/ cost, credited the hard work and knowledge of custodial staff members as a key factor in her decision.

“When we reviewed cost comparisons, there would be, in fact, a cost savings by going with an outside contractor,” said Floyd. “However, when we factored in the quality of service provided by our own staff, the flexibility afforded by you -- the TWU staff, your long-term familiarity with the needs of the university, and consideration for the staff and your families, it was my recommendation to Dr. Surles that at this time we retain our staff to perform custodial services. You should take pride in knowing that what you contribute as individuals made the difference in this decision.” Floyd’s announcement was interrupted by applause from custodial staff members in Denton, Dallas (Parkland and Presbyterian) and Houston; videoconferencing was used to share the news with approximately 60 staff who participated at the four locations.

Floyd said, “Please understand also that we will be required on an ongoing basis to evaluate costs and services to ensure that the university is provided the highest quality of services for the resources that are expended.” She added, “I am calling on each of you to constantly look at ways we might do things better -- and more efficiently -- so that when we are asked to justify the continuation of providing in-house custodial services, we can with pride and confidence say, ‘We can do it better, and with comparable costs.’”

Earlier this year, TWU bid custodial services to evaluate options for providing such services, according to Floyd, who set a 10 percent savings minimum as the basis for whether TWU would consider contracting out custodial services. Information gathered from the bid process indicated that the university would save approximately 10 percent, and Floyd repeated to her audience that the work, flexibility and familiarity of TWU custodial employees -- which she said cannot be quantified on paper -- were factors that influenced her recommendation.

During a brief question-and-answer session, Floyd reiterated that custodial services and other areas of the university will be re-evaluated continuously; however, a comprehensive study like the one conducted during FY 97 in custodial services would not occur during FY 98. She made no promises beyond that point and said, “I have to reserve the right to continually evaluate services. But I hope that we, working together, can begin to cut costs and contribute to saving the university money, which will take us farther into the future.”

SWEARING-IN CEREMONIES FOR NEW REGENTS SET

TWU's three new regents -- Dr. Cynthia Perry, Marie Martch and Douglas Myers -- have been scheduled to participate in swearing-in ceremonies, following Senate confirmation this spring. Perry, a retired United States ambassador, was sworn in as regent on Wed., June 18, during a 3:30 p.m. ceremony at the TWU Institute of Health Sciences Houston Center. Her oath was administered by Judge Dwight Jefferson of the 215th District Court.

Martch, a resident of Belton (Texas) and TWU alumna, and Myers, a Plano banker, will be sworn in by Judge Jeff Moseley of Denton County prior to the regents' next board meeting on June 26 and 27; Perry also will participate. The ceremony will be held at 11 a.m. on ACT 16 next Thursday, following a 10:30 a.m. reception to honor new and current regents.

The TWU board of regents will meet in committees on Thurs., June 26, starting at 1 p.m. and on Fri., June 27, from 9 a.m. to noon. The public meeting of the board will begin at 1 p.m. on Friday; all sessions will be held on ACT 16, and the general public and members of the campus community may attend.

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NEW COMPONENT WILL HELP WITH STUDENT RESEARCH

A new component -- Undergraduate and Graduate Research Support -- has been established at TWU to coordinate and promote the university's efforts in student research. The office, which will be directed by Dr. Michael Droge (biology) and staffed by Susan Phillips (chemistry and physics), is located in SC 001-003.

"The UGRS office is eager to assist TWU students in pursuing scholarly activities appropriate for their chosen field of study," said Droge. "One of our initial tasks will be to gather information about students who are involved with research. Since research opens minds -- and doors! -- this effort should serve TWU students well."

The new office will work within the university and with external constituencies as well to:

- target recruitment activities for student research;
- obtain external funding for programs of student research;
- assist students in finding and applying for research scholarships and fellowships;
- coordinate TWU support services for students;
- increase student research activity;
- assist students with finding and obtaining post-graduate training and career opportunities;
- develop a university-wide system to track current and former students' research and career activities; and
- facilitate program evaluation.

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MEMORIAL GARDEN DEDICATED

Representatives of the Trinity Forks chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas presented a plaque to TWU on Thurs., June 19, to dedicate a memorial garden honoring the society's co-founder Benny Simpson, who died last year. Dr. Beverley Byers-Pevitts (academic affairs) accepted the plaque on the university's behalf from chapter president Lou Kraft. Simpson and former TWU President Mary Evelyn Blagg-Huey began the Native Plant Society of Texas in Denton in 1979 at TWU. Simpson was responsible for the commercial introduction of many now-common landscape plants, and he encouraged the use of native Texas plants in landscapes.

Byers-Pevitts said, "On behalf of Dr. Carol Surles and Texas Woman's University, I would like to thank the Trinity Forks chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas for cultivating and dedicating the Benny Simpson Memorial Garden on our campus. TWU is known for the beauty of its campus, and the society's gift will only add to that reputation. We also are pleased that our gardens were chosen as the site where the society honors a man who greatly influenced Texas horticulture and landscaping.

"Not only will the garden be enjoyed by students, faculty, staff and visitors for years to come, but the endeavors of Benny Simpson will be remembered as well," she added.

The Benny Simpson Memorial Garden was designed by G. Owen Yost, a Denton landscape architect and columnist for the *Denton Record-Chronicle*. The garden, approximately 400 square feet, incorporates Wax Myrtle, Inland Seaots, Longspur Columbine, Turk's Cap and Native Redbud. Located south of the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods, the garden will provide a colorful setting all year for visitors and the campus community. Money, plants or materials for the garden were donated.
