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the college

The Texas State College for Women, created by an act of the 27th Legislature in 1901, formally opened its doors to students September 23, 1903. Now observing its Golden Anniversary, the College combines the wisdom of maturity with the vigor of youth. Its traditions, exemplified in the unswerving loyalty of more than 50,000 ex-students, are as rich and fully developed as those of the older Eastern colleges. But it continues in the role of pioneer, having already amassed a record of more than fifty "firsts" in the history of higher education in Texas.

The purpose of the Texas State College for Women is to provide superior educational opportunities for its students in an environment adapted to their distinctive requirements as women destined for the important responsibilities of living as well as leadership in a society growing daily more complex. Although the resources of the institution are, therefore, mobilized at all times to meet a diversity of individual and group needs, whether in liberal arts or in technical areas, the program also emphasizes strongly the elements which unify while they enrich, for the benefit of all students, the total educational effort of the College.

Over and above its general mission of developing women who combine such characteristics as competence and charm, culture and self-reliance, enthusiasm and poise, character and tolerance, Texas State College for Women recognizes its responsibility to train students to be high-minded citizens full of a deep, abiding respect for both the glories and the obligations of American citizenship.

admission to freshman class

High School Graduation

Fifteen units as listed below from an accredited secondary school with graduation are required.

English	3
Mathematics (at least one unit in Algebra)	2
Chosen from Foreign Language, Social Science, Natural Science....	4
Electives	6

Students whose credits do not conform to the above pattern should submit their records for individual consideration for conditional admission.

College Entrance Examinations

A student under 21 years of age who has not graduated from an accredited secondary school may be admitted by passing college entrance examinations over fifteen acceptable units.

Individual Approval

An applicant for admission, twenty-one years of age or over, may be admitted to the college without examination. She must show evidence that she has substantially covered the work required of other applicants and has sufficient seri-

ousness of purpose to do the desired work.

admission to advanced standing

Students transferring to TSCW from another recognized college should submit a transcript of credits to the Dean of Admissions for evaluation and acceptance.

admission to graduate division

Graduates of this College, or of any university or college recognized as in good standing by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, are admitted to the Graduate Division. Interested students should obtain a Graduate Bulletin by addressing the Registrar, TSCW Station, Denton, Texas.

Students may register for any one of four degrees in the Graduate Division: Master of Arts, Master of Education, Master of Library Science, or Master of Business Education. Requirements are fully outlined in the Graduate Bulletin. The major subject may be selected from one of the following fields: art, chemistry, economics and business, education,

English, government, health, physical education, and recreation, history, home economics, mathematics, music, recreation, sociology, Spanish and speech.

Using funds made available through the TSCW Foundation, the Doctor of Philosophy degree is available in four areas of home economics.

summer session

The summer session extends over a period of twelve weeks and is an integral part of the regular college year. The session is divided into two terms of six weeks each. During each term, classes are conducted on five days of the week, Tuesday through Saturday inclusive. The normal load for a student during each term is six or seven hours.

Several of the College departments hold special workshops in addition to regular courses. Some of the workshops to be offered during the summer session of 1953 are the following: Art Education, Business Education Conference, Trends in the Development and Teaching of Science, Use of Industrial and Technological Resources in Teaching (award-winning Traveling Workshop), three Education workshops, Current Trends in English, Spanish, Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Aquatics School, Clothing and Textiles, seven workshops under the College of Household Arts and Sciences, Journalism, Library Science, Mathematics, Music, Radio, and Speech.

Summer school expenses are moderate and in proportion to the charges for the regular session. For special Summer Session bulletin, address the Registrar, TSCW Station, Denton, Texas.

student activities

A democratic relationship between students and faculty members is one of the basic principles of the College. Students, in cooperation with faculty sponsors, participate in the major College

activities through five all-campus organizations:

THE COLLEGE GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION develops citizenship by giving to each student the opportunity to participate in democratic community life. Students thus have a voice in formulating and administering the policies of the College.

THE STUDENT FINANCE COUNCIL raises funds for projects which include the offering of scholarships, contributions to agencies such as the Red Cross, and aiding in the maintenance of the Student Union Building.

THE STUDENT COUNCIL OF RELIGIOUS ACTIVITIES is composed of two representatives from each of the local churches. It promotes the spiritual life of the campus, arranges vesper services in the dormitories once each week and a worship service each Sunday morning in the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods.

THE ROUND TABLE coordinates social activities of the various campus clubs. The schedule of programs is arranged so that every student has an opportunity to participate in several organizations.

THE WOMEN'S RECREATION ASSOCIATION conducts a program of recreation activities that promote happiness, health, fellowship, and worthy use of leisure time. The varied program includes sports, dancing, aquatics, outings, and special events.

Three periodicals are published by students: The Daily Lass-O, the Daedalian Quarterly, and the Daedalian Annual.

recreation

TSCW affords recreational opportunities in inviting variety.

"The Pub" offers quick relaxation in the friendly atmosphere of its recreation room and soda fountain service. Television, automatic record player, table games, fountain service, and space for dancing make the Union Building's

recreation room a popular spot.

Facilities include play-fields for all sports, hard and clay tennis courts, an 18-hole golf course, outdoor and indoor swimming pools, archery range, dance studios, a large gymnasium equipped for volleyball, badminton, and basketball, and cabins for camping in the campus woods.

Lake Dallas offers opportunities for camping, water sports, and picnicking. The College's own 20-acre campsite has three cabins for the accommodation of outing groups. The College recently acquired a 118-acre campsite at Lake Texoma.

An outstanding Concert and Drama Series presents musicians, ballet dancers, symphony orchestras, lecturers, and major theater companies—all of national or international reputation.

The College choirs, choruses, bands; the literary-social, regional, and departmental clubs—all offer additional opportunities for recreation and entertainment.

housing information

The main housing units of the College are nine modern, three-story, brick dormitories, which provide fireproof, comfortable college residences. Nine smaller buildings provide supplementary housing units for an overflow and for mature and graduate students. Additional houses are available for students who wish to save expense by living under a cooperative system.

The following regulations govern housing:

1. All students whose homes are not in Denton are required to live in the College dormitories and to take their meals in the College dining halls. Such students must file with the Registrar formal application for room and board on Blank A, secured from the Registrar's office, and must agree to abide by the conditions set forth in this application blank.

2. Students are permitted to change their rooms during the first two weeks

of each semester, provided such changes are presented to the directors of the dormitories and are approved.

Undergraduate students are required to have roommates unless they request to room alone and agree to pay an extra fee of \$25.00 per semester during the regular session and \$7.50 per term during the summer session for this privilege. Students who for any reason do not have roommates and who do not agree to pay this extra fee will be assigned to a room with another student.

3. Students for whom rooms are reserved are expected to report on the first day of the College session. If a student who has paid her assurance fee for a room in a dormitory fails to report by midnight of the first day of classes, she forfeits her room unless she has previously notified the College as to the time she expects to arrive.

4. The College furnishes each student who lives in the regular dormitory system with her bed linen and one pair of blankets. All students must provide their own towels. Students living in the cooperative halls must supply their own linens and blankets.

5. Students' trunks should be plainly marked with name and, if possible, addressed to the proper dormitory. Students on arriving in Denton are advised to retain baggage checks until they reach the dormitory.

6. The College authorities reserve the right to make, for any cause, at any time, changes in dormitory assignments.

college services

Health Service

The College maintains its own modern hospital, resident physician, and staff of nurses. Standards of health, periodic physical examinations, and careful attention to individual difficulties are emphasized along with the treatment of illness.

Placement and Guidance Service

The Placement Bureau collects records, recommendations, and qualifications for every graduating senior. These are kept on file and are used to help girls find the position for which they are best suited in the locality in which they desire to work. Former students have the privilege of writing back to the bureau for re-registration and additional help in finding new jobs. The College makes no charge for this service.

The guidance program is designed to aid students who need help in making decisions and adjustments, to provide vocational information and testing services, and to help students with study problems.

Speech and Hearing Clinic

To assist students needing remedial help with speech and hearing problems, the College maintains a Speech and Hearing Clinic. Individual therapy is available for any student requesting the service.

Extension Service

The College believes that, so far as its resources and facilities permit, its services should be available beyond the limits of its campus. Cultural programs and information material are presented through lectures and demonstrations by its college faculty members, through various types of publications and through organized extension classes.

Loan Funds

Aided by many gifts from interested friends, ranging from \$1 to the \$50,000 presented by the estate of Will Hogg of Houston, the College has loan funds available to students who need financial assistance. These loans are available to both freshman and upper-class students. Requests for further information about loans and applications for loans should be made to the Secretary, Loan Fund Office, Box 2906, TSCW Station, Denton, Texas.

Student Employment

Many deserving and ambitious young women in Texas are unable to attend college unless they can earn at least a part of their expenses. The College desires to find employment for as many of these as possible and provides a limited number of positions to take care of these needs. Those seeking employment should address the Student Employment Office, Texas State College for Women, TSCW Station, Denton, Texas.

The College offers to superior students who have attended the College at least a year a number of assistantships in its various departments. These positions pay varying amounts up to \$100 a semester.

honors and scholarships

Distinction in scholarship is recognized by the award of honors in two forms: Intermediate Honors for the work of a single semester, and Final Honors for the entire college course. Students receiving Final Honors are given honorable mention at the time of their graduation.

The College awards annually a large number of scholarships which have been made possible by outstanding Texas citizens and organizations. The value of these scholarships ranges from \$50 to \$200. In addition, 12 annual Freshman Scholarships, valued at \$100 each, are provided by the students of the College through their College Government Association, to entering freshmen whose high school records give promise that they will render outstanding service to the College, both as students and in extra-curricular activities. Also awarded annually are 15 TSCW General Scholarships, valued at \$100 each, which go to students of the College who have made outstanding records. Application blanks are available at the Office of the Dean of Admissions.

expenses

As the following schedules indicate, the only standard variations of expense for students in the residential system of the College are (a) in board and room charges for the Regular Dormitory System and the Rusk Cooperative System, respectively, and (b) in the tuition rate for in-state and out-of-state students, re-

spectively. Personal expenses naturally vary according to individual tastes, but the average minimum requirements, in line with the policy encouraged by the institution, are very modest. Students at TSCW have unsurpassed educational advantages available at the extremely low costs described below.
