A VACATION OF RECREATION AND CULTURE

Are you planning to attend college next summer? Wouldn't you like to travel instead of being shut up in a classroom? We offer you the opportunity to earn three hours Home Economics credit while enjoying a glorious vacation in foreign lands.

How It Happens—Miss Vallière G. Decker of our Home Economics department has been spending her vacations abroad, each year more enthusiastic over the unique opportunities the Old World offers its student guests. She has explored cities, villages and towns by train and donkey, by motor and carriage, by gondola and launch, seeing much that the hurried visitor does not find. This summer she offers to share these experiences with a limited group of our students and their friends.

Where We Are Going—First to London for a week, spending two days on a motor trip out to Oxford and the Shakespeare country (a play at Stratford if the season has begun). Then Bruges, the old city Longfellow loved, on the canals. Cologne and a steamer ride up the storied Rhine to Wiesbaden, a beautiful resort. Heidelberg,

a most charming university town, and then by motor through lovely northern Bavaria, visiting Rothenburg, a typical walled-town of the Middle Ages.

Did you hear the boardcast Christmas day from Nuremberg? We shall have a day in this city of the Meistersingers. Next Munich, capital of art and music. Motor from here through the Alps, stopping at Oberammergau and Innsbruck.

Three glorious unhurried weeks in Italy—Venice, the Byzantine city of the Adriatic; Ravenna, where the glowing mosaics still picture the life of Justinian's court of thirteen hundred years ago; Rimini, a marvelous beach; a short visit to San Marino, the smallest republic in the world.

Five satisfying days in the mellow old city of Florence; Perugia and Assisi, quaint little hill-towns on our way to Rome. Naples and excursions to Vesuvius, Pompeii, and Sorrento; the Amalfi Drive and a day on the Island of Capri. Pisa, where you feel right back in medieval Italy; Milan, home of Leonardo's fresco, and a modern industrial city which is Mussolini's pride and joy.

Scenic Switzerland for a week with stops in Lucerne, Interlaken, Montreux and Geneva. The final week in Paris with trips out to Fontainebleau, Versailles and Chartres.

College Credit—Seniors and graduate students may earn three hours credit by doing certain preliminary reading and submitting a report after their return. Those who do not wish credit will find the programs of general interest.
