TWU COLLEGE OF NURSING CELEBRATES 50 YEARS

The TWU College of Nursing will celebrate its 50th anniversary with a conference and banquet on April 16 during TWU's homecoming.

The conference, titled "Nursing Values, Patient Needs and Political Realities: Contradictions & Confluence," will take place on the Denton campus from 8:15 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. The goal of the conference is to provide a forum for participants to consider how nursing values continue to offer a foundation upon which to approach present and future issues and challenges.

Presenters include Dr. Patsy Keyser, TWU professor emerita; Dr. Cheryl Taylor, director of the office of

nursing, Southern University and A&M College School of Nursing; and Dr. Lynn Wieck, president, Texas Nurses Association.

Registration is \$50 before April 5 by calling the Office of Lifelong Learning at 8-1-3408. After April 5, the conference cost is \$60. A boxed lunch is available for \$10.

Immediately following the conference, an anniversary reception that is open to the public will take place in Hubbard Hall. At 6 p.m. the banquet will begin in Hubbard.

Dr. Carolyn Gunning, interim provost and former dean of the College of Nursing, will be the banquet's featured speaker. Banquet tickets are \$30 per person and are available by calling Lifelong Learning by April 5.

The Texas State College for Women, now TWU, established a baccalaureate nursing degree program that replaced the Parkland Hospital School of Nursing in 1954. In 1960, at the request of the Texas Medical Center, the program was expanded to Houston. Today, Texas Woman's University has the largest nursing program in the state of Texas, offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Anniversary celebrations will take place on the Dallas and Houston campuses in October and November, respectively.

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TWU TO HOLD MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR GERTRUDE GIBSON

TWU will say farewell to longtime friend Gertrude Gibson with a public memorial service on Sunday, March 21 at 2 p.m. in Hubbard Hall. Ms. Gibson, a TWU benefactor and retired employee, died Feb. 22.

Ms. Gibson began her career at TWU in 1934 and retired in 1987. During her time at TWU, she served as director of development, worked in the Dean of Women (now Student Life), admissions and registrar's offices, as well as traveled throughout Texas and adjoining states promoting TWU. She was a graduate of McKinney High School, Baylor University and TWU.

She was involved in and honored by numerous civic organizations. Her organization memberships included the Denton County Historical Society, Denton County 4-H Club Committee, National Home Fashions League, Heard Natural Science Museum and Wildlife Sanctuary, Texas Farm Bureau, Beautify Texas Council and Wild Basin Institute for Environmental Studies.

In 1983, she received the Friend of 4-H Award from Denton County 4-H. She received the TWU President's Award in 1985 for her part in establishing the first Texas Wildflower Day. In 1987, she helped found the Denton Beautification Committee, which evolved into Keep Denton Beautiful.

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TWU TO HOST BOOK LECTURE/SIGNING

TWU distinguished alumna Dr. Lou Rodenberger will discuss *Let's Hear It: Stories by Texas Women Writers* at 3:30 p.m. March 24 in the Blagg-Huey Library. A reception and book signing will follow.

Let's Hear It: Stories by Texas Women Writers, edited by Rodenberger and Sylvia Ann Grider, includes stories by 22 Texas women writers. Among the authors are Joyce Gibson Roach, Beverly Lowry, Carolyn Osborn, Annette Sanford, Denise Chavez, Katherine Anne Porter and Judy Alter.

Rodenberger and Grider introduce each story and place them in historical and literary context to weave a story of their own — the story of women's writing in Texas from 1865 to the present.

The book is published by Texas A&M University Press as part of the Tarleton State University Southwestern Studies in the Humanities Series.

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GRANTS ANNOUNCED

Dr. **Jo Ann Engelbrecht** (research and sponsored programs) announced several TWU faculty have received research and training grants.

Dr. **Young-Hoo Kwon** (kinesiology) received \$122,297 as a subcontract from Martinus Van Breemes Inc. on an award from the National Institutes of Health for a project titled "Walk Pole Study – Phase II." The purpose of the study is to investigate the long-term biomechanical effects of pole walking exercises with telescope-style walking poles on key gait parameters in physically frail elderly subjects.

Dr. **Kelley Moseley** (health care administration-Houston) received \$6,000 as a subcontract from the Baylor College of Medicine on an award from the Health Resources & Services Administration for a project titled "Gero-Ethics Educational Programs in Health Care Administration." The project is designed to conduct gero-ethics training for master's level students and geriatric practitioners. The project also seeks to inform minority and disadvantaged middle and high school students about careers in health care administration.

Dr. **John Radcliffe** (nutrition and food sciences) received \$6,000 from the Almond Board of California for a project titled "Determination of the Vitamin E Content of Products Containing Almonds."

Turner, senior research associate, **Michael Springer**, project director/grant coordinator, **Tameka Odom**, program coordinator, and Dr. **Bill Cissell** (health studies) provided logistical and scientific support during the February 19-21 meetings of the SCSN Steering Committee and its work groups in Dallas. The SCSN project grant has generated more than \$1.5 million in funds over the past seven years for health studies faculty, students and staff to support the Steering Committee and its work groups in developing and updating plans that guide and support Ryan White Care Act grantees in conducting needs assessments of persons living with HIV and AIDS.
