HAPPY BIRTHDAY, HERR SCHUBERT!

"Happy Birthday, Herr Schubert" is the focus of a faculty recital at TWU on Mon., Nov. 10, featuring Lanelle Blanton (performing arts, music) and pianist Harold Heibert, professor of music at the University of North Texas. The event, which is free and open to the public, will be held at 8 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Blanton, a soprano, will sing 21 songs by Franz Schubert, who wrote more than 600 songs -- plus orchestral music, chamber music and pieces for piano and other instruments -- during his 31-year life. "Our intension is to perform and to pay homage to Franz Schubert, who was recognized very little during his lifetime but who has made a profound impact on musicians everywhere," said Blanton.

Blanton, a TWU faculty member for 22 years, has performed as a soprano soloist with several symphony orchestras and opera companies throughout the United States. Recently, her research into the music of Native Americans has captured national attention. Blanton has lectured about and performed Native American music at a number of area community colleges, Texas Christian University, the University of Pennsylvania, Bucknell University and the National Association of Singers annual meeting in Seattle, Wash. She arranged the soprano, piano, flute and percussion music for her presentations. The TWU professor of music is co-author of *Principles of Pop Singing*.

Heibert is recognized internationally as a concert pianist, coach, accompanist and translator. A member of the UNT College of Music faculty for 26 years, he has performed more than 100 recitals in western Europe, including the "Palace Concerts" in Salzburg. Heibert, who has been on the faculty of the American Institute for Musical Studies in Graz, Austria, since 1969, also has performed with leading European and American artists as an accompanist. He moved from New York City to Texas in 1971 and has served as an official accompanist for the national Opera America auditions; for Pierre Bernac's master classes in French songs; and (as a coach-accompanist) for the Dealy Awards finals. He also has translated many art songs and choral works for major music publishers, as well as opera for the Juilliard School, the New York City Opera and the San Francisco Opera.

PRESIDENT ADDRESSES ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) and members of the TWU executive staff spoke to the Administrative Council about activities and the university's strategic plan on Thurs., Oct. 30. Surles talked about the Alliance for Higher Education, corporate partnerships in higher education, distance learning, the Dallas Education Center and other areas. Each vice president presented a brief overview of activities, and Dr. Leslie Thompson (Graduate School) discussed distance learning. Dr. Jim Alexander (history and government) briefly talked about the next legislative session and appropriations.

Surles reported on TWU's involvement with the Alliance for Higher Education, which includes approximately 25 corporate members and 25 higher education and community college members. Those entities continue to look at professional development initiatives and cooperative ventures. Texas A&M University has applied for membership in AHE, and Surles participated as a member of the site team for a visit. She said, "Texas A&M clearly wants to offer academic and professional development and vocational programs using TAGER (AHE's distance learning network)." The University of Houston also has applied for membership in AHE, and the University of Texas has made an application to offer distance learning programs in north Texas. She added, "EDS and Texas Instruments want to go into Oklahoma for programs to address their specific needs."

The president emphasized that TWU must "scan the environment constantly...and scan the competition constantly..." and look at "global and economic forces" that affect what the university will offer and how TWU is involved in distance learning and corporate partnerships. "We must maintain a proper balance," she said, "...and we must ensure that we are called to the table to participate in the decision making process."

As chair of the Federation of North Texas Area Universities, Surles has been involved in discussions with Dallas business leaders about the DEC. Business and civic leaders want the center to offer degree programs; university leaders believe that such a move also will make a difference in the center's enrollment. "But we also need to get some financial help with 'bricks and mortar' from area businesses," added Surles. "Approximately one-third of the DEC's budget comes from legislative appropriations." She also discussed cost-effectiveness and budget at TWU, infrastructural needs and the gap in the university's 1998 fiscal year budget.

Dr. Beverley Byers-Pevitts (academic affairs) reported that her area is moving forward with strategic planning and that academic affairs is working with other divisions of the university -- such as student life and the new undergraduate student research office. "We also are working more closely with human resources to advertise positions for faculty members, and we are working more efficiently with the controller's office with on-line approvals." She added that her division and information technology services are communicating in a direct, open manner and that they are collaborating on a four-year plan, prioritizing needs.

Dr. Brenda Floyd (finance and administration) pointed out that her division is re-evaluating processes to improve service in her area, citing how quickly travel reimbursements are handled now as one example of positive change. She said that all buildings have been re-evaluated as well, "...which will position us positively as we look at space use...to determine more effective and efficient use of our buildings." She also reported that two officers in public safety work every shift, and officers have increased their visibility on campus. She asked administrators to encourage staff members to attend training sessions now offered through human resources.

Kathleen Gigl (institutional advancement) discussed efforts in alumni relations, development and public information related to strategic planning. She reported on specific goals and objectives the division has met, including the addition of more academic alumni chapters, increased interaction of geographic chapters with faculty as presenters and efforts to start chapters in areas where a number of TWU alums live. She said, "I also thank each one of you -- deans, faculty, staff and others -- who made our first Houston Alumni Day successful. A real energy was present that brought together alumni, current students, faculty and staff." Gigl mentioned that *TWU Update* is now online, that the theme this year for public information staff is "Pioneers and Partnership" and that staff members are seeking names of TWU pioneers (past, present and future) from all deans, directors, faculty and staff on campus as the university moves toward Centennial.

Dee Siscoe (student life) reported on strategic planning in her division and said, "We have had a busy fall, but we also have been very pleased with student involvement." Pioneer Days is one example of the division's efforts in that area. She also mentioned changes in the infrastructure of student government (now United Students Association) and the status of student dining services. Student life also has restructured some committees, which has "...made students more accountable and more involved," said Siscoe.

Texas documents relocated

The Texas documents collection in the Blagg-Huey Library has been relocated to the northern end of level one (on the first floor), near the photocopy room. "This collection includes publications we receive from all state agencies as a designated Texas State Depository," said Dr. James Galloway (library). "You can find annual and biennial reports, studies on a wide range of subjects, journals, newsletters, directories, guides and statistical publications."

Some items are received in microfiche format (instead of paper) and are stored in a file cabinet across from where the paper collection begins. Large paper items are designated as Quarto Texas documents and are located in two large filing cabinets across from the collection. Publications are shelved under call numbers assigned from the Texas documents classification, which groups together all items issued by each state agency.
