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BLACK HISTORY MONTH EXHIBIT OPENS

The work of artist George W. Moseley is featured in an exhibit titled *Recent Works by George W. Moseley* in the West Gallery of the TWU Arts Building. The free exhibit will be displayed through Feb. 28 and features abstract multi-media pieces as well as works addressing black issues. The galleries in the Arts Building are open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. For more information, call the department of visual arts at 8-1-2530.

Moseley, who lives in Denton, teaches drawing and painting at the Dallas Arts Magnet High School for the Performing and Visual Arts. He said that the eight pieces included in the show represent a shift toward more three-dimensional work. "My intent was to create something that could be enjoyed from a distance, but also something in which you could start to see different layers and the movement within those layers as you get closer," said Moseley.

The artist's large, brightly colored works incorporate layers of sharply-cut pieces of styrofoam, arranged in circular patterns which reveal "hidden" images such as faces, insects, signs, newspaper clippings or fangs. The artist said the approach was a means of breathing some new life into his work.

"I had been doing a lot of wash paintings for a while, trying to create a sense of spatial depth, and I guess it just evolved into this," he said. "I was trying to create something that was breathing, as if a certain piece never stopped breathing -- even after you would walk away from it. I was trying to take it to another level."

Moseley, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of North Texas, has seen his work exhibited throughout the metroplex and as far away as Denver, Colo. He has served on numerous committees related to the arts and has lent his talents as an instructor to various art workshops.

Moseley said the pieces featured in *Recent Works* reflect his "dual" personality. "I can work purely with the abstract aspect and get a sense of self-gratification from that," he explained, "or it can be like one of the paintings in the exhibit, where I used an old relic I found in my house in Denton. It was an old sign that said 'whites' with an arrow pointing one way, and 'blacks' with an arrow pointing the other way. When I first saw it, I couldn't believe it. When you see something like that, it's pretty hard not to be inspired in some way by it."

INAUGURAL FOUNDERS' AWARD HIGHLIGHTS FOUNDERS' DAY 1998

During its first 100 years, TWU has grown, prospered and marked a trail in education as the nation's largest university primarily for women. Many friends have helped along the way and several will be honored in February when TWU presents its first Founders' Day Award, recognizing contributions that have made the university's achievements possible.

Representatives from Texas Instruments Incorporated, the Ariel and Woman's Shakespeare Clubs and the City of Denton will receive the inaugural TWU Founders' Award -- presented by both the university and the TWU National Alumnae Association -- during a banquet on Fri., Feb. 20, during the annual Founders' Day celebration in Denton.

Tickets for the event are \$20 per person; advance reservations are required. Call the TWU NAA at 8-1-2586 for details or reservations. Activities include a reception at 5:30 p.m. in the Blagg-Huey Library, followed by an awards dinner at 6:30 p.m. in Hubbard Hall.

Donna Ryan (alumni relations/TWU National Alumnae Association) said both the award and the event underscore the importance of those who have lent their support to the university through the years. "Founders' Day at TWU offers an opportunity for both the university and the TWU National Alumnae Association to honor those who have helped us," Ryan said. "Our history is filled with collaborative, supportive relationships and efforts involving the association, TWU, individuals and organizations who have and will continue to help us pioneer higher education, especially for women."

Marion Walters, vice president of programs for the TWU National Alumnae Association, said these activities draw attention to those responsible for taking TWU into the future. "TWU has thrived because our founders had a vision," she said. "Since those early days, continuing pioneers have helped the university grow. We continue to see founders in our midst every day who begin new programs or organizations, helping students or promoting the university, such as the first women student leaders conference that will be held on campus this spring."

Texas Instruments was chosen by the university and the TWU NAA to receive one of three inaugural Founders' Day awards, based on their advisory role in and financial support of TWU's 3+2 program in engineering; the contributions of women engineers from TI who serve as mentors for TWU students; funding for the Mary Washington Wedgeworth Mathematics Laboratory in Denton; and the company's support for the new, non-traditional degree program which has grown from TI's partnership with TWU.

The Ariel and Woman's Shakespeare Clubs, meanwhile, have been singled out for efforts put forth by the memberships of both organizations to make Denton the home of the Girls Industrial College. As members of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, both organizations worked together to persuade the site selection committee that Denton was the most suitable location for such an institution.

The City of Denton has been chosen for a Founders' Award based on its initial and continuing support of TWU. Ever since the business and civic leaders of Denton first provided the land -- an artesian well -- upon which the university was built in 1901, the city has worked with TWU to ensure that students have a proper environment in which to study, work and live.

Begun in 1924 by the Ex-Students Association, Founders' Day originally was known as Pancake Night. In 1936, when the school (previously known as the College of Industrial Arts) was renamed Texas State College for Women, the event was given its present name. Observance of Founders' Day was discontinued from 1955 to 1978, at which point former TWU President Mary Evelyn Blagg-Huey asked the NAA to assume responsibility for planning the event.

Dr. Carol Surlis (president's office) said the event gives participants a chance to meditate on the past as they contemplate the future. "Founders' Day affords the opportunity to reflect on the contributions of those wonderful visionaries who set TWU on a solid foundation -- philosophically and literally," she said. "We look forward to celebrating those who pioneered the university's future in 1901. As we look toward our centennial year, I hope we will be especially introspective about our cherished core values. Indeed, to preserve our rich legacy, we must recommit ourselves to Texas Woman's University -- to pioneer our future for the 21st century."

TWU retirees for 1998 will be honored at a special event on Tues., April 21, at 6:30 p.m. in Hubbard Hall during the university's annual retirement recognition dinner. 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LIBRARY ADDS TO HOME PAGE

The TWU Blagg-Huey Library recently has updated its home page with the addition of two full-text databases. IDEAL, by Academic Press, is an online electronic library containing all 175 Academic Press journal abstracts and table of contents that are presented in HTML, plus associated full-text articles delivered in Adobe Acrobat 3.0 format. The major subject categories in IDEAL include biomedical sciences, economics, business, law, finance, engineering and material sciences, life sciences, mathematics and computer science, physical and environmental sciences, psychology and social sciences.

The other new database is PROJECT MUSE by Johns Hopkins University Press, which provides access to the full text of the press's more than 40 scholarly journals in the humanities, social sciences and mathematics.
