The YWCA Women's Resource Center in Dallas and TWU will co-host a luncheon and special program titled "What Every Woman Should Know..." on Thurs., Jan. 29. The program, scheduled from noon to 1:30 p.m. at the University Club in the Dallas Galleria, will provide participants with the latest information on women's health from two physicians: Dr. Sydney Bonnick (osteoporosis services, Center for Research on Women's Health) and Dr. David May of Cardiovascular Specialists PA.

"We are pleased to participate in this program as a co-sponsor with the YWCA Women's Resource Center," said Dr. Charlotte Sanborn (Center for Research on Women's Health). "In 1993, the National Institutes of Health started the Women's Health Initiative to improve the knowledge specific to health problems of older women. That same year, TWU established our center, which conducts research on the health and well-being of women throughout their lives."

Presenters will discuss menopause and osteoporosis in women; current research which will improve knowledge about and prevention of osteoporosis; and key risk factors that every woman should know.

"The YWCA Women's Resource Center is beginning a new year with a networking opportunity related to women's health," said Paige Park, director of the YWCA center. "We are inviting interested persons -- particularly women -- to join us and find out more about what's being done on osteoporosis and cardiovascular disease, how we are bridging the gap on inequity in research for women's health and how women can take charge of their health," added Park.

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PLAYS AND TOMMY TUNE HEADLINE ACTF FESTIVAL AT TWU

TWU will serve as the site of the regional event for the 30th annual Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival from Feb. 24 to March 1, 1998. Seven full-length productions and a student-written one-act work, all selected from colleges and universities throughout the five-state region of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico, will be performed at the festival. Renowned performer Tommy Tune also has agreed to talk to participants at the conference as a keynote speaker during the

week-long festivities.

The seven plays are: *Craving Gravy or Love in the Time of Cannibalism* from the University of Texas at Austin; *Call the Serpent God to Me* from the University of Texas at El Paso; *Nastavnik*, a compilation of two Brecht one-acts, from Northeastern State University; *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* from Louisiana State University; *Kid Purple* from Tarrant County Junior College South Campus; *Royal Gambit* from the University of Central Arkansas; and *Dr. Sex* from the University of New Orleans. *Guarding the Bridge*, a one-act production written by University of Oklahoma student Chuck Gordon, also will be performed.

In addition to performances, the ACTF regional festival will feature workshops, forums, critiques, audience response sessions and auditions for the Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship. The general public is welcome to attend any of the eight performances and the final round of the Irene Ryan auditions. Charles Harrill (performing arts, drama) is serving as the festival host.

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STUDENT RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM SCHEDULED

The office of undergraduate and graduate research support has scheduled TWU's first student research symposium, which will be held April 16 and 17 on the Denton campus. "Undergraduate and graduate students from all academic disciplines are invited to join the celebration of scholarly activities during this inaugural symposium at TWU," said Dr. Michael Droge (biology/UGRS). "This (event) is a great opportunity for students to gain experience presenting their research or creation of art, and to add to their resumes."

The symposium will feature presentations, exhibits, a luncheon and a keynote address titled "Ethics in Research," by Richard O. Mason, the Carr P. Collins Distinguished Professor, from Southern Methodist University.

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TWU IS HOME FOR OFFICES OF NATIONAL RESEARCH COMMITTEE

With the appointment of Dr. Brenda Phillips (sociology and social work) as secretary-treasurer of the Research Committee on Disasters -- committee number 39 of the International Sociological Association, the offices of the world's major disaster research body will move to TWU. Joseph Scanlon, director of one of Canada's foremost disaster research units at Carleton University on Ottawa, announced that Phillips accepted the four-year appointment. As a result, the research committee will be housed in the office of women's studies at TWU during that time, where Phillips serves as program director.

"Students at TWU will benefit from being involved directly in technologically-based dissemination of information about the research committee," said Phillips. "And TWU's offer to provide space, faculty, staff and student support, and a web site location for the research committee enables Denton to maintain its reputation as an international location for disaster awareness, scholarship and education. Denton is the home of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's national teleregistration center and has a regional FEMA office."

Phillips has been involved in research on disaster management -- particular community action plans after disasters strike -- and has traveled to a number of disaster sites to conduct her studies. Dr. David Neal, director of a program at the University of North Texas which offers an undergraduate degree in emergency administration planning, is Phillips' spouse. UNT most recently served as home for the Research Committee on Disasters.

"Providing a home for the Research Committee strengthens TWU's service to local, state, national and international disaster preparedness, response and recovery efforts. It also links TWU to the United Nations' 'International Decade for Natural Disaster Reduction Efforts,'" said Phillips. "Texas is well-known for its various major disaster sites, including a Galveston hurricane in 1900 that claimed 1,500 lives. TWU is pleased to be of service to the larger community by accepting this offer to become the new home for the Research Committee on Disasters."

The committee has a worldwide membership with executives representing Italy, Great Britain, New Zealand, Costa Rica, India, Germany and Canada, as well as the United States. It publishes both a newsletter and the *International Journal of Mass Emergencies and Disasters*, considered the world's leading scholarly journal on disasters, according to Phillips. Part of TWU's responsibility as home base for the committee includes maintaining and updating its web page and participating in membership recruitment by attending professional conferences. TWU doctoral student Alison Herring (sociology) will handle responsibilities for the web page.

Phillips and Neal have worked together on scholarly research on disasters for a total of nearly 40 years' combined experience. Their work includes funding from the National Science Foundation, NASA, the U.S. Geological Survey, the Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy, among others. Most recently, they conducted research on the March 1997 Arkansas tornadoes. Phillips continues to collect data on the long-term recovery of Arkadelphia, Ark., and Neal provided volunteer service for the National Weather Service reconnaissance team. Both are local American Red Cross volunteers.

"With the untimely death of clarinetist Jesse Youngblood last spring, our group reorganized, and The Zephyr Winds reflects a working artistic alliance among TWU, Midwestern State University and the Wichita Falls Symphony."

Youngblood and Rodean are full-time faculty in the department of performing arts; Wheeler is an adjunct faculty member and principal clarinet with the WFSO. Shouha, principal oboe with WFSO, is a doctoral candidate in musical arts from the University of North Texas; Schaffer is an adjunct professor of music at MSU and music director and conductor for WFSO; and Morrow -- the Dolores P. Bolin Distinguished Chair of Piano at MSU -- serves as principal keyboard member for WFSO. She will serve as visiting professor of piano at TWU this spring while Dr. David Yeomans is on research leave.
