PURPOSE OF EXTENSION SERVICE

With a view to making an additional contribution to the social, civic and community life of the people of Texas, the Texas State College for Women maintains a Department of Extension. The College is interested in the live problems of the day and its aim is to come in touch with the daily life of the people and to help in promoting every forward looking movement which serves the interest of the State. The College believes that, so far as its resources and facilities permit, its services should be available beyond the limits of its own campus, to those who do not have the opportunity to be resident students or to participate in its extra-curricular activities or its lecture, drama or artist programs. The purpose, then, of the Extension Service, is to assist in the artistic and literary advancement of the State through its cultural programs, and to give to the people practical, usable information which it has been able to assemble through its faculty, its libraries, and its laboratories.

SCOPE AND WORK OF THE COLLEGE

The Texas State College for Women is a standard college conferring the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Master of Arts. The courses of study meet all the requirements of the standard liberal arts colleges and universities, and at the same time they include technical and industrial training which prepares for remunerative vocations and for the more practical phases of life. The College is a member of the Association of Texas Colleges, The Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, The Association of American Colleges, The Southern University Conference, The American Association of University Women, The American Council on Education, The American Library Association, The American Association of Library Schools, and is approved by the Association of American Universities.

TEXAS STATE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

The College offers more than ninety-six groups of courses leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science. These groups of courses include majors in the following subjects: History of Art, Religious Leadership, Bacteriology, Botany, Pre-Medical Course, Zoology, Chemistry, Industrial Secretary and Laboratory Assistant in Chemistry, Economics, English, French, Latin, Spanish, Government, History, Home and Family Life, Library Science, Mathematics, General Music, Physics, Sociology, Advertising Design, Art Education, Costume Design and Fashion Illustration, Design, Interior Design, Painting, Religious Service, Bacteriology and Laboratory Diagnosis, Chemistry, General Science, Accounting and Business, Business Education, Foreign Trade, General Business, Merchandizing, Secretarial Studies, General Education, Intermediate-Grammar-Grade Education, Kindergarten-Primary Education, Secondary Education, Health and Physical Education, Clothing and Costume Design, Clothing and Textiles, Foods and Nutrition, General Home Economics, Home Economics and Journalism, Home Economics Education (Vocational Home Economics), Institution Management, Journalism, Music Education for General Supervisor, Music Education for Instrumental Supervisor, Organ, Piano, Violin, Voice, Home Demonstration, Speech, Nursing.

Beginners' courses in Freshman subjects are offered during both the first and the Second Semester of the regular session; the Mid-Winter High School Graduate can therefore enter college the Second Semester and secure a full program of College work. This applies also to the Summer Session.

Students having completed certain designated college courses may, without further examination, receive, from the State Department of Education, State Teachers' Certificates.

The College gives adequate training for many of the best vocations now available to women. Through a faculty advisory system assistance is given to each student in planning a program of study especially adapted to her needs.

KINDS OF EXTENSION SERVICE OFFERED

The staff of the Extension Department is composed of lecturers, artists, and demonstrators, who are members of the regular instruc-

tional force of the College. The following are the different kinds of service rendered:

- (1) Compiling, publishing, and distributing bulletins on subjects of special interest to the home and the community.
- (2) Lectures on social, practical, educational, and literary subjects from the various departments of the College.
- (3) Lectures and demonstrations of important home-making activities given by trained and experienced experts from the Departments of Home Economics and of Rural Arts.
- (4) Music-recitals, dramatic expression recitals, and illustrated lectures from the Department of Music, the Department of Speech, and the Department of Fine and Applied Arts, respectively.
- (5) Lectures, Clinics and Demonstrations, and Consultant Services are offered by the Department of Health and Physical Education in the fields of dance, sports, and health education.
- (6) Services of judges for debates and oratorical contests, for contests in Home Economics, Fine and Applied Arts, Rural Arts, and for such other contests as are usually held at community, county, and State fairs.

WOMEN'S CLUBS, PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATIONS, AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Supplementary to these more formal types of service, the Extension Department gives co-operative assistance to clubs, civic improvement leagues, and other organizations which have community welfare as their objective. The women's clubs of the State receive assistance in the form of yearbooks, outlines of study, bibliographies, and, in a number of instances, material from which to prepare lectures and club papers. The Department also acts as a clearing house for assembling and distributing valuable information and suggestions in response to individual inquiries on concrete home-making problems.

The purpose, then of the Extension Service, is to assist in the artistic and literary advancement of the State through its cultural programs, and to give to the people practical, usable information which it has been able to assemble through its faculty, its libraries, and its laboratories.

BULLETINS

The bulletins issued by the Department of Extension are written by members of the regular college faculty, each author being a recognized expert in his or her chosen field. The subject matter constituting the bulletin has, in every case, a vital bearing on home or community life as is indicated by the titles listed below. The bulletins are distributed free of charge upon individual request for single copies. However, if more than one copy of the same bulletin is desired by any one person, or if the bulletins are to be used by members of a class or club a charge is made of twelve cents (12c) a copy. This pays for the actual cost of the publication. It has been found necessary to make this charge because the demand for the bulletins has far outgrown the ability of the service to finance their unrestricted free distribution. It is suggested that when the bulletins are desired by a class or club, some one member of the organization make the order for the whole number of bulletins required, and that the money be sent in form of a money order payable to the order of the Texas State College for Women, rather than in postage stamps.

CLINICS AND DEMONSTRATIONS

JUDGING FOR CONTESTS

Expert service is furnished to schools, or to community, county or State fairs, in judging exhibits in dairy or poultry products, in foods, textiles, and clothing and in fine and applied art. Judges may be secured also for interscholastic debates and oratorical contests.

EXPENSES

The College does not charge any fee for the services of its faculty members on Extension, but it will be necessary for the organization desiring such service, to pay the expenses of the trip. This change in policy in regard to paying the traveling expenses of faculty members, is due to the Appropriation Act passed at the last session of the Legislature which prohibits the payment of traveling expenses to State employees unless the purpose of the trip can be classified strictly as "State Business."

TEXAS STATE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

EXPENSES—(Continued)

The expenses of an extension trip include transportation, meals, and lodging (if any). In regard to transportation, this would mean train or bus fare, if one of these methods of transportation is used, with the understanding that if a car is used, the charge will be that authorized by the State; that is, five cents per mile each way. The payment of these expenses should be made directly to the faculty member, and will not be handled through the Department of Extension.

The Community requesting Extension service, will be expected, as formerly, to meet the local expense incurred in arranging for a meeting place, in giving the occasion local publicity, and in furnishing supplies for demonstrations.

Communities wishing to arrange for demonstrations, lectures, or musicians, should allow ample time for correspondence concerning the kind of program desired; however, such programs can be arranged for within a week's notice, if necessary.

As indicated in the foregoing page of this bulletin, no change is to be made in the various types of Extension service offered, which are as follows: Bulletins; individual club helps, such as study outlines, suggestions for programs, and books loaned from the Library; Judges for State and County Fairs, or for Music and Speech contests; and Extension lectures made by faculty members. Requests and arrangements for all such services will continue to be made through the Department of Extension. The only change therefore in policy is that necessitated by the legislative action mentioned above regarding traveling expenses.

The Department of Extension wishes to emphasize its willingness to serve the State in every way possible, and cordially invites inquiry for any additional information not contained in this announcement.
