TWU TO CELEBRATE FOUNDERS' DAY

TWU will honor the *Denton Record-Chronicle*, the Trinity Forks Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas, and Gus and Margaret Davis of Irving during its annual Founders' Day luncheon Friday, Feb. 15.

The event, which begins at 11:30 a.m. in the southeast ballroom of Hubbard Hall, pays tribute to the friends and organizations that have contributed to TWU's success.

Tickets to the luncheon are \$25 per person. Reservations are required by Monday, Feb. 11, and may be made by calling the TWU Office of Institutional Development at (940) 898-3863.

The TWU Founders' Award is presented by both the university and the TWU National Alumnae Association.

Award recipients are Margaret and Gus Davis, the *Denton Record-Chronicle* and the Trinity Forks Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas.

Mrs. Davis was a member of the TWU Board of Regents from 1974 to 1986, serving as chair for three of those years. She also is a former member of the TWU Foundation Board. She and her husband provided the funding for the fountain that stands in front of the Blagg-Huey Library.

The *Denton Record-Chronicle* has been a longtime supporter of TWU through the newspaper and the Patterson family. Bill Patterson, CEO and publisher, serves on the TWU Foundation Board.

The Trinity Forks Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas was formed at TWU and conducted its meetings on the campus for many years. The society designed the Benny Simpson Garden on the university's grounds.

Founders' Day was known as Pancake Night when the Ex-Students Association started it in 1924. When the school (previously known as the College of Industrial Arts,) was renamed Texas State College for Women in 1936, the event was given its present name.

Observance of Founder's Day was discontinued from 1955 to 1978, at which point former TWU President Mary Evelyn Blagg-Huey asked the NAA to assume responsibility for planning the event.

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A.S.S.E.T. AWARDS SPRING SCHOLARSHIP

Congratulations to graduate student **Gayla Clough**, who has won A.S.S.E.T.'s Spring 2002 scholarship. Clough works as a secretary for the BRIDGES Program at TWU's Science and Math Center for Women, while majoring in counseling psychology with an emphasis on child and adolescent psychology. Outside of her studies, Clough has been involved in mission outreach and mentoring. She plans to research, develop and evaluate programs for children and adolescents in inner city neighborhoods.

A.S.S.E.T. (Association of Service and Support Employees of Texas Woman's University) established its scholarship program in 1989 to encourage the professional growth of the university's permanent full-time and part-time staff members.

The organization will honor the 15 staff scholars who applied for the scholarship and present Clough with her \$200 check at the Celebrating Staff Scholars spaghetti lunch on Feb. 22. The lunch will be at noon in SC 207.

Money for the 15 scholarships awarded during the last 13 years has been raised through bake sales, chili pie suppers and other events. However, A.S.S.E.T. is committed to establishing an endowed scholarship. The organization plans to have a cookbook sale later this spring as a fundraiser.

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FLORIDA ARTIST HAS SOLO SHOW AT TWU

Maggie Taylor, a Florida digital photography artist whose work recently adorned the New York City subway system, will discuss her art at TWU at 1 p.m. Feb. 18 in the West Fine Arts Gallery, which is the site of her ongoing solo show "Mythical Dreamscapes."

The lecture is free and open to the public. Mythical Dreamscapes, a collection of highly imaginative photo works that appear to be paintings, runs through Feb. 22.

Taylor, a resident of Gainesville, Fla., scans objects one at a time into her computer, then assembles creative collages. She creates the finished works by printing the images on a watercolor paper, which lends a painterly quality to the prints.

The West Fine Arts Gallery is located in TWU's Visual Arts Building. Gallery hours are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday.
